1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

#### Feedback Obtained

The University aims to offer the best possible environment and learning experience to encourage students to perform to their full potential for academic achievement. Students, teachers, parents and alumni play an important role in the evaluation, development and enhancement of the quality of this learning experience. Feedback from all of them help to evaluate its policies and make changes as per stakeholders requirements. The Feedback process has put an emphasis on the need for involvement of students in the quality assurance of higher education. Student involvement requires that students should act as collaborators rather than merely passive receivers of teaching and learning process. All the stakeholders feedback data is collected and analysed from time to time. Feedback system is being evolved by the University and manual feedback has been taken from faculty serving in different Departments of the University, who are members of Board of studies on the curriculum . Feedback from faculty has also been collected during faculty meetings. The University is making efforts to encourage the feedback from more number of students. Efforts were made to contact the alumni and get their feedback for improving the curriculum and the teaching learning methodologies. The stakeholders gave their feedback on the course curriculum, syllabus, content, applicability in life situations, practical/laboratory/clinical work etc. The feedback form is scrutinized and specific suggestions are discussed and incorporated by the respective committees. Feedbacks related to Academic questions/classes are discussed at the Department Level. If required, the issues are taken up by the IQAC/ Board of studies. If not resolved at their level, the same is referred to a committee formed at the next higher level by the Management. The consolidated feedback is discussed with the concerned faculty Key issues are addressed during the faculty development programs. The curriculum development process involves verification and validation on a continuous and regular basis to ensure that it meets the requirements of all the stakeholders. The University is continuously striving to improve and incorporate the suggestions. The infrastructure will be upgraded to suit the latest trends and requirements eg. ICT enabled classrooms, upgradation of laboratory and equipment, renovation of the hospital for increased satisfaction of the stakeholders. However, there is a lot of scope for improvement like reaching out to the students and alumni.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring is a relationship between a more experienced person (mentor) and a less experienced one (mentee). As a new entrant to the professional course at the Santosh deemed to be University one has a unique opportunity to be mentored by a faculty member. The mentor-mentee relationship is based on mutual trust, respect, and a willingness to learn and share. The central point is encouragement, constructive comments, and openness. The mentor encourages the mentee to reach her/his full potential by sharing knowledge and experience, and provides emotional support and encouragement. It is a natural phenomenon that arises from the desire of a senior and experienced individual to give and the need of an inexperienced novice to grow. Mutual trust, faith and respect while working towards a shared vision of objectives and achievements are the main driving force of a mentoring relationship. It requires the mentor to give selflessly and the mentee to accept graciously while conveying his needs and being an active partner in the process. A mentor is looked upon as a guide, confidante, counsellor, teacher, friend, supporter, and much more in professional and career development as well as psychosocial or personal aspects. The mentor is expected to take a proactive role in guiding and managing the process. The program has short term and long-term goals. The short-term goal is to introduce an immediate support network for incoming students. Thus, new entrants will get familiar with life at college, academically and culturally, so that they can better achieve their full academic potential. The long-term goal is to cultivate a mentoring culture at Santosh deemed to be university that will engage all strata of students and every faculty member. It is envisaged that every mentoring relationship will be unique in its nature and scope and will develop over time. The variable perspectives and different experiences of every mentor and mentee will add to the success of the program. Santosh Medical College and Santosh Dental College have a strong mentoring system in place. Various faculties groom and help students in batches. A good rapport with the students helps in the mentoring and students are forthright in approaching their respective mentors whenever any situation arises. There is a highly efficient and smooth mentoring system in place. It helps in the overall development of the students and helps to create a stress-free environment. The goal of mentorship is to foster the career development of each student member such that he or she achieves satisfaction, fulfilment and success. Formal, structured and accountable mentorship programs have been shown to enhance the success of individual students and therefore departments as a whole. In collegiality addition, mentorship improves and the feeling of being connected to colleagues. The mentor plays a role in teaching, advising and providing support/ encouragement to the mentee.

Hospital Administration In order to run the hospital administration efficiently, decentralization with participation from various parties is essential. Each administrator has a specific role to be performed.On day to day basis functioning of the hospital, Medical Superintendent is supported by the Deputy Medical Suprintendent and supervise the various areas of the Outpatient care, In patient care, Emergency, Lab,

Radiology, Purchase, Maintanence, Pharmacy, Dental, Nursing, Security, Kitchen , Laundry , Accounts and the Housekeeping. The clinical Departments in the Hospital each are being governed by the Head of Departments and under them are the respective Units. The Nursing Suprintendent organizes the duties of the nurses and ensures good nursing care to the patients round the clock. The Operation manager manages the maintanence, laundry, electrical supply, Genset of the hospital. The housekeeping and security are outsourced and managed by their respective supervisors giving a coverage to the hospital 24x7. Fortnightly all the executives submit their reports through the Deputy MS to the MS office for discussion and to formulate strategies for the betterment of the Hospital. The Medical Superintendent has a sanctioned financial limit and if any purchase above this amount, it has to be through the Purchase committee headed by the Vice Chancellor.

Title of the Practice: Best policy regarding Water and Energy Conservation Objectives of the Practice: The objective is, for the University to operate in a sustainable manner managing energy and water consumption by using them efficiently and judiciously. The Context: The university has aligned with the usage reduction targets and has set a goal to reduce energy and water consumption annually The Practice: This protocol applies to all faculty, students, non-teaching staff, researchers and other members of the campus. The campus sustainability plan states that every member of the campus community will act sustainably and will make informed choices in all areas of campus life be it education, research and operations. The University is also committed to increasing sustainability through implementation of the 'Campus Sustainability Plan'. Evidence of Success: Policy history: The university came up with idea of energy and water conservation in the year 2017 Committees were designed for the progress of the same as energy and water are essential to university operations to support all work, study and research. Simple measures which could be managed by all departments, colleges and units through awareness and adoption of the

most efficient procedures and practices were popularized. The core responsibilities are entrusted with the members of the campus community including all the faculty, students, non-teaching staff, researchers and visitors are to follow the set rules and regulations towards the success of the policy statements. A special energy steering committee was constituted for the oversight, guidance and endorsement of energy conservation on campus, approving the energy management plan and energy reduction targets and updating this policy. Awareness programs on 'save water and electricity' were conducted regularly. Leaking pipes and faucets were checked regularly and fixing of inefficiencies was carried out in the campus. Efficient ways of saving water were included by visiting experts to guide about watershed management and sustainable practices for water conservation. Finance and Resource: The management was responsible for providing sponsorship of the Energy and water conservation policy. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Shortage of adequate skilled manpower for implementing the same. Notes: The University has policies and procedures with goals of energy and water efficiency and

continuous improvement in practice. 2. Title: Redefining and Restructuring of SOP Standard operating procedure (SOP) is a set of dedicated stepwise instructions compiled by our university to help students and health care workers to carry out routine Objectives of the Practice SOP plans to get effective and efficient result with ultimate objective to achieve promptness, efficiency, quality and uniformity with reduction of miscommunication. The Context Standard Operating Procedures is the key to streamline processes and operations at every level of working. Special expertise and care is needed to design cost effective and result oriented SOPs as per the needs of the

University. However, designing a SOP is not an easy task. Care has to be taken in defining each and every aspect of the procedures and rules Even though we paid utmost attention to the SOP, there were difficulties which we faced and we had to restructure the SOP. Some areas which were not planned were added and in some SOPs which were impractical were deleted and a new SOP was added. The

Practice In our University all the departments have their own SOPs besides common SOPs of University. Some of the SOPs which came into existence during COVID time were followed very strictly. Besides this every department has its own SOP. Some of the common SOPs followed are : SOP for OPD patients, SOP for Environmental Cleaning, SOP for Maintenance of Equipments, SOP for Management of Postoperative Patients, SOP for Resuscitation of Sick patients, SOP for

Contraception, SOP for IPC, SOP for Biomedical Waste disposal, SOP for for new cases, SOP for Tobacco cessation. Each department follows such SOPs at every

level starting from Patients, Nonteaching, Students and Faculty. These practices are monitored properly. Evidence of Success SOPs helped in reduction of costs in patients with increase in quality. More safety was ensured as the risks decreased. It helped in improving the standard of work and all those who were involved got trained also. The improvement is visible as it improved the quality through persistent implementation of processes within colleges and

hospitals and reduced work effort and good creditability. Problems Encountered and Resources Required Some of the SOPs have to be revised as received
